

Dr. Barry S. Verkauf entered Tulane Medical School in 1961 with an interest in both medicine and law, and plans to enter forensic pathology. An elective with a practicing attorney, who turned out to be a "ambulance chaser", ended his interest in a law career, but his senior thesis in order to graduate was on the medical legal aspects of artificial insemination. This was published the following year in the Houston Law Review. He did a surgical internship at Charity Hospital in New Orleans, and then entered the Obstetrics and Gynecology Residency at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore where he completed his Residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology, his Residency and Fellowship Training in Obstetrics and Gynecology and Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility. While there he had the good fortune of exposure, tutelage, and mentoring from Drs. Howard and Georgeanna Jones. He then served 2 years in the Army Medical Corps before returning to his hometown, Tampa, Florida, in 1974 and joining in the Founding Faculty of the University of South Florida, Morsani College of Medicine. He initiated the Division of Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility within the Obstetrics and Gynecology Department. While maintaining a part-time appointment and teaching activities within the medical school, in 1980 he entered private practice of Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility. Subsequent to the birth of America's first IVF baby at Eastern Virginia Medical School where the Joneses had moved after their retirement at Hopkins, he in spent a month with them in 1984 Norfolk learning the ins and outs of establishing an IVF Program, at a time when Drs. Suheil Muasher, Zev Rosenwaks, and Jairo Garcia were on the early faculty at Eastern Virginia Medical School. On returning to Tampa he organized and implemented a combined IVF program serving Tampa Bay community and the university with input from each with, the first on the West Coast of Florida and the first in Florida, managing an in vitro fertilization birth in their 20th patient in 1985 , the first in Florida..

In private practice, he founded, managed and grew the Reproductive Medicine Group, the largest on the West Coast of Florida, and one of the most successful consistently since that time in the State. In 2011, he retired from active practice with the Reproductive Medicine Group and rejoined the USF Faculty with which he had maintained an appointment and relationship since joining there in 1974, rising from the rank of Assistant Professor to Professor within that department. From 2012 to 2016 within the Division of Reproductive Endocrinology in the Department of OB-GYN he organized and managed The Menopause Center (TMC) at the University of South Florida, College of Medicine.

His first exposure to ASRM was in 1967 when as a resident, he attended the ASRM Meeting in Washington DC hearing Dr. Kurt Semm's first American lecture on his progress in operative laparoscopy in the field of gynecology. This further heightened his interest in the subspecialty of Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility which he pursued and was one of the earliest awardees of subspecialty certification in REI in the United States in 1980. He has been an active member of the American Society for Reproductive Medicine since 1969 having attended almost every meeting since then. He was a Charter Member of SART, the Society of Reproductive Surgeons, and the Society of Reproductive Endocrinologists, , the first SIGS of the American Society of Reproductive Medicine. He served on what at that time was the American Fertility Society's Technical Exhibit Committee from 1981-1983, on the Society Development Committee from 1981-1994, the AFS Registration Committee from 1987-1989, the American Fertility Society Subcommittee on Fertility Listings in 1987-1988, and helped with the organization and enhancement of the annual exhibit showcase at ASRM meetings from 1987-

1994. From 1988-1996 he was a State Legislative Monitor and on the Public Relations Committee of ASRM and from 1995-1196 on the Industry Committee. In 1999-2009 he was on ASRM's CPT Coding/RBVS Committee. From 2000-2015 he served as alternate Delegate and the Delegate to the AMA for ASRM. During those latter 15 years as Delegate to the AMA, he attended many ASRM Board Meetings which were held at the time of the annual meeting. He participated in fund raising efforts for the Society intermittently during the past 45 years. He has been active locally within his community and state in the advancement of the Assisted Reproductive Technologies and was a Founding Member and the third president of the Florida Society of Reproductive Endocrinologists. He has published 25 articles in the scientific literature related to ART, 2 book chapters and 3 books, as well as contributed to 12 abstracts and communications at annual meetings. Over the last 20 years he has been awarded many honors recognizing his clinical and leadership expertise, and most recently was recognized by Marquis Who's Who with their Lifetime Achievement Award in Medicine.

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
